

A Grass-Roots Volunteer Based Organization – Dedicated to helping those less fortunate

Brief Description



The International Children's Fund (ICF) is a 501c3 non-profit organization that provides humanitarian aid to desperately poor children and their families throughout the world.

ICF has grown from one man's mission to help starving children to an organization that literally spans the globe. For more than 30 years, ICF has partnered with a network of highly dedicated indigenous pastors who serve as our eyes and caring hands within the local communities. These pastors identify the greatest needs within their villages and then work closely with ICF to request, receive, process, and distribute our lifesaving aid. There is no bureaucracy, just dedicated people who are committed to making a difference in the lives of those who need it the most.

ICF's goal is to make a sustainable improvement in the lives of those that we serve. As such we split our programs into two categories - programs that sustain life (food, clothing, and medicine) and programs that create local skills or capabilities toward self-sufficiency. As an analogy, we provide fish to those who are hungry and also teach people how to fish so that they never go hungry again.

Sustaining Life



During 2010, ICF supplied more than \$37 million of life-saving food, clothing and medicine to 11 missions in 6 African countries.

Food – Food is the most basic of all needs. During 2010 ICF shipped more than 172,000 pounds of food from the US and also provided funds for local food purchases.

Clothing – Clothing and shoes are not mass produced in Africa and so are relatively scarce and expensive. Our dedicated volunteers collect used clothing and shoes from throughout our community, pack and ship them to our missions for distribution. During 2010, we shipped more than 320,000 pounds of clothing and shoes to our missions.

Medicine – Medicine in Africa is in extremely short supply and is simply too expensive for most of the people who desperately need it. Through the generous support of various pharmaceutical suppliers, we were able to obtain and ship medicines sufficient to treat more than 350,000 people who were suffering from illnesses ranging from Malaria to AIDS.

Building for the Future

We recognize that our goal is to make a sustainable improvement in the lives touched by our missions and as such we have numerous programs designed to provide the training and resources needed to promote self-sufficiency within the communities that we serve.

Education - This is the key to self-sufficiency. During 2010, ICF has supported numerous projects to construct and equip elementary schools, middle schools, and vocational schools. From rural Ghana to the Kibera slums, ICF has supported the construction/renovation of schools and the supply of school equipment and books.

Water - Clean drinking water is a scarce commodity in Africa. As such, ICF has and will continue to support the construction of water wells in rural areas where no such facilities existed. The following shows Dr. Bruening at one of the water wells constructed with ICF's assistance:

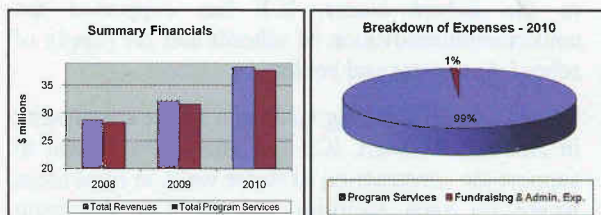


Commerce - ICF has supported numerous projects to create micro-commerce within the communities that we serve ranging from the supply of equipment or materials to the purchase of land for farming. These programs allow an individual or a community to generate an income to support themselves and then progressively to support others.

Fiscal Management

ICF is committed to be good stewards of our talents and our resources. We take our responsibility as a Christian charity very seriously and work diligently to identify the most efficient and cost-effective means of securing and delivering humanitarian aid to those in greatest need.

During 2010, more than 98% of our total expenses were for program services and less than 0.3% went to management and administration.

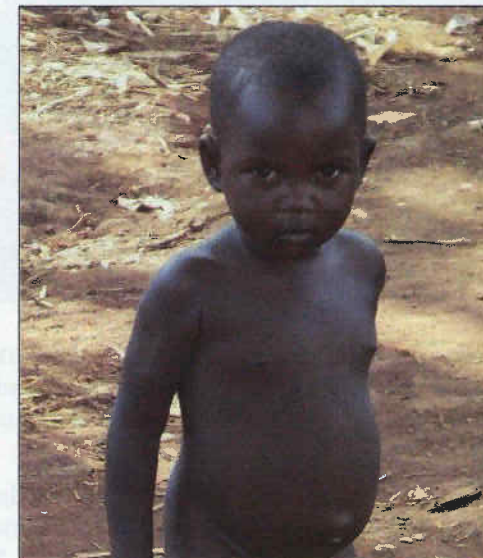
